Week 1: Beginning Obedience

Attention is the **key** that makes training possible. Your dog watches you and your family all the time. He is constantly learning from observation. Now we want him to learn that watching you is fun and rewarding, too!

INSTRUCTIONS

Building Engagement with Your Dog

- 1. **Recognize Quiet Attention:** Observe your dog and reward calm focus on you. When your dog looks at you, mark with a "YES" and reward with treats, toys, or affection. Ignore pushy or rude behaviors to reinforce positive attention.
- 2. **Name Recognition:** Call your dog's name when they're already engaged with you. Mark and reward them immediately when they look at you. Repeat consistently to strengthen the association.

Teaching Eye Contact

- 3. **Lure and Reward Eye Contact:** Start by holding a treat near your dog's nose, then guide it to your face. Mark with "YES" when your dog makes eye contact and reward immediately. Gradually increase difficulty by moving the treat away while waiting for eye contact.
- 4. **Reward After the Behavior:** Once your dog understands the task, keep rewards hidden until they perform the desired behavior. Use a variety of rewards, like food, toys, or games, to keep them motivated.

Improving Training Success

- 5. **Discourage Jumping:** If your dog jumps on you, withdraw attention by turning away or leaving the area. Only reward when all four paws are on the ground to encourage appropriate behavior.
- 6. **Practice in Easy Environments First:** Begin training in distraction-free zones where your dog already pays attention. Gradually introduce new environments and distractions, using higher-value rewards for more challenging situations.
- 7. **Track Progress:** Keep a journal to note changes and improvements in your dog's behavior. Small changes may go unnoticed without careful observation.

Troubleshooting: No change? Make sure you aren't using your dog's name to scold or nag. Only say it once.
