# 2023 Point in Time Count Data Released

The Point in Time (PIT) Count is a federally mandated yearly effort to count all sheltered and unsheltered person experiencing homelessness on one night at the end of January. This year in northern Colorado, the PIT Count occurred on Tuesday, January 24th. A full report with trend analysis will be forthcoming, but the NoCO CoC has released an interactive data dashboard for the 2023 PIT including demographics, [available on our website](#).

#### **Loveland Housing Authority awarded \$3.7 million in Transformational Affordable Housing Grant**

On March 28th, the CO Division of Housing released the first round of grantees for the Transformational Affordable Housing Grant totaling \$28,345,000.

Congratulations to the Loveland Housing Authority who was awarded \$3,729,000 for land acquisition to build an estimated 216 new affordable housing units.

#### **When More Satisfying and Supportive Relationships Increase Loneliness: The Social Worlds of People with Lived Experience of Homelessness**

People experiencing homelessness often have small and fragmented social networks. The resulting loneliness can severely impact the physical and mental health of this population and become a barrier to exiting homelessness successfully.

This study examines the social networks of people with lived experience of homelessness and offers recommendations for how service providers can best support people exiting homelessness.

## Coordinated Assessment Housing Placement System (CAHPS)

CAHPS is the community-driven process to identify, assess, refer, and house all people experiencing homelessness in Weld and Larimer Counties.

**Since 2016, the CAHPS process has helped house over 1500 households.**
