FACT SHEET



THE PROBLEM

- Predatory Behavior Unlike other vultures, black vultures actively attack live animals, often in flocks of 20+.
- Targets Newborn calves, lambs, goat kids, piglets; pregnant livestock during birthing.
- Economic Impact Estimated \$2,000 loss per calf.
- Population Surge Up 468% since 1990 to 190+ million birds.
- Attacks Increasing Nearly 25% more cattle attacks between 2020–2025.
- Current Law Requires depredation permit before taking action, costing time and putting livestock at risk.

THE SOLUTION

Black Vulture Relief Act of 2025 – Sponsored by Senators Mullin (OK), Tuberville (AL), Schmitt (MO), Cornyn (TX).

KEY PROVISIONS


- **1. No Depredation Permit Needed** Producers can take black vultures **immediately** if livestock is threatened.
- **2. Annual Reporting** Simple yearly report to U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service on the number taken.
- 3. No Poison Use Ban on poison remains in place.
