

## Procedure for Release of Abstract of Judgment and Child Support Lien

The procedure for releasing AJs and child support liens by affidavit changed in September 2021.

## Procedures for releasing AJs:

- 1. We will need an email or written statement from the judgment debtor/seller stating they would like Law Offices of T. Alan Ceshker, PC (LOTAC) to assist with removing the liens from their homestead.
- 2. The judgment debtor (or investor) will issue payment of \$750 (per AJ) -- if related to a closing. If not related to a closing, this is an hourly paid service with a retainer of \$1,050.
- 3. We will draft a HOMESTEAD AFFIDAVIT AS RELEASE OF JUDGMENT which the judgment debtor signs in front of a notary and returns to our office.
- 4. The affidavit will be filed in the appropriate county property records.
- 5. The recorded affidavit will be forwarded with the statutory required correspondence to:
  - a. The judgment creditor's last known address;
  - b. The judgment creditor's attorney as listed on the AJ; and
  - c. The judgment creditor's attorney's address listed on the state bar website (if it is not the same as b).
- 6. The statutory CERTIFICATE OF MAILING will be generated.
- 7. At the end of the statutory period (i.e. 30 days from delivery), the CERTIFICATE OF MAILING with a copy of the letter(s) sent and the CCMRRR forms will be recorded in the county property records.
- 8. The creditors have 30 days to file an affidavit in the property records disputing the homestead affidavit and release process.
- If not disputed, the affidavit will serve as a release starting 31 days <u>after</u> the CERTIFICATE OF MAILING is recorded. A closing must occur within 90 days of the CERTIFICATE OF MAILING being recorded or the release process will need to be repeated.

## Procedures for releasing child support liens

1. The process is the same as above, but only the claimant needs to be sent a copy of the lien, HOMESTEAD AFFIDAVIT AS RELEASE OF JUDGMENT, and letter via CCMR to their last known address. The OAG does not need to be noticed.
